We are inviting the youth that would have celebrated their final year to sell an animal in 2020 to return this year, to sell their hand raised livestock and personally thank their past buyers.

We welcome a new carnival this year. Together, we will offer a "quiet time" for our patrons that find a noisy midway overwhelming. We are glad to offer this service for the first time. We also have some new entertainment, returning favorites, and more local performers in the Gazebo.

We are rolling out a new on line registration this year, for convenience and efficiency. I encourage everyone to give it a try. We will still take last-minute entries, but in an effort to maintain distance and safety the on line registration is the preferred method. This will allow us to have your tags preprinted and save you time on Wednesday evening. We recommend you pre-enter all possible entries; it is easier to cross out "no shows" than add late entries into our computer system.

We are so delighted to be back, and look forward to seeing all of you. Maybe in the last year of stay home, stay safe, you took up a new hobby, or got back to one you enjoyed in the past. If so, please think about entering your finished projects. It can be anything you completed since our last fair in 2019. Most of all, come and enjoy our fair! Without you, our patrons, there would be no reason to open the gates.


The Marquette County Fair Board sincerely hopes that this event will continue to grow through the participation of people throughout this area.

## MARQUETTE COUNTY FAIR ENDOWMENT FUND



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



## **Camping Rules:**

Camping on the Fairgrounds is a privilege allowed only to Concessionaires, Stalled Horses & Livestock Exhibitors – we have beautiful camping facilities at the fairgrounds with new electrical service. To be sure everyone has a positive camping experience we must obey a few rules...

- 1. At last one adult (21 years or older) must be present at campsite to supervise minor children
- 2. Camping fees will be for the duration of the fair \$50 with electricity & \$20 for rustic
- 3. Payment for camping fee does **not** entitle persons to enter the fairgrounds without payment of admission fee. *ONE* wrist band will be given per campsite. **HOWEVER**, *every* person staying at the campsite **MUST** wear a wrist band and can be purchased for \$15 for 12 years & up \$6 ages 5 to 11 years, 4 & under free. Wrist bands **MUST** be worn at ALL times and will be checked.
- 4. Camping fees must be paid 15 days prior to the start of the fair
- 5. Horse/Livestock trailers to be parked in designated
- All dogs MUST BE contained at campsite not allowed on Midway or in the barns during Fair hours.
- 7. **ONE** vehicle allowed to park at campsite all other will be assigned a location on the grounds
- 8. No skateboards/bikes/ Personal ATV/UTV.
- 9. Golf carts with board approval in camping area only
- 10. Quiet time observed from 11:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. \*\*\* Camping Contact: Cindy (906) 250-5153\*\*\*

## **MARQUETTE COUNTY FAIR - LIVESTOCK EXHIBITORS**

## PARENTAL CODE OF CONDUCT

Inappropriate conduct by a participant, parent, leader, spectator or volunteer during the fair will be grounds for immediate disqualification and/or immediate ejection by Fair staff, Management Agent, or Marquette County Fair Board. This includes, but is not limited to, disruptive behavior, poor sportsmanship, inappropriate language, inappropriate conduct, bullying and confrontations with any fair staff, other exhibitors or spectators.

As a parent or legal guardian, of a Jr. Market Livestock exhibitor, exhibiting at the Marquette County Fair I agree to abide by the following:

- Maintain and promote a positive attitude towards the atmosphere of the Jr. Market Livestock program and follow all barn rules.
- I agree to encourage and guide my child, my club member, and myself to conduct ourselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. I will ask questions concerning rules and policy in an appropriate adult manner.
- Instead of participating in a retaliatory manner, I will follow the Formal Protest guidelines in the Marquette County Fair Book.
- I will keep the intent and spirit of the Marquette County Fair, and remember that my child/club member is the one exhibiting, not me. I will place the emotional and physical wellbeing of my child/club member ahead of my personal desire to win
- No adult or exhibitor will conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of conduct and Marquette County Fair show rules or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of conduct or show rules.
- I have read and understand the rules and regulations found in the MCF Exhibitors Guide.
- By signing this code of conduct I am accepting the responsibility of informing my immediate family members of the Parental Code of Conduct.
- Violation of the parental code of conduct will subject the individual (s) to disciplinary actions, up to and including, but not limited to; dismissal or disqualification, expulsion of the exhibitor.

## **EXHIBITOR CODE OF CONDUCT**

## As an animal exhibitor in the MCF Market Livestock Youth Show(s):

- I believe my participation should demonstrate my own ability, knowledge, and skills as a feeder, fitter and caretaker of my animal(s).
- I understand the need to be responsible for developing the skills necessary to take my animal(s) from the farm to the show ring.
- I will follow the competition rules and will not use abusive, questionable, or unethical techniques in the feeding, caring, fitting and showing of my animal (s).
- I will not resort to fraudulent, illegal, or deceptive practices when preparing my animal(s) for the show ring.
- I will also not allow my parents, leader, or any other adult or minor to employ such practices to my animal(s).
- I have asked my parents, leader, or any other adult or minor to not break the rules on my behalf.
- I want my animal project to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer, good and bad, and how to live with the outcome.
- I will respect my fellow exhibitors, and their project, and realize I have no right to disrupt or disturb their animal, barns or stalls. I further realize it is my responsibility as an exhibitor at the Marquette County Fair that I must report any or all unusual activity in or around any barn.
- I realize that I am responsible for:
  - The proper care and humane treatment of my animal(s).
  - The production of wholesome food if my animal project is designated for market.
  - The care and grooming of my animal while at the Marquette County Fair.
  - Conducting myself with honesty and good sportsmanship.
  - Conducting myself to reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education.
- I understand and agree that when I, my parents, leader or any other adult or minor connected with my project or animal(s) break the rules, I agree to live by the final decision of the Marquette County Fair Board regarding disqualification of myself and /or my animal (s), loss of premium awards, auction proceeds, and my loss of future eligibility.

Parents or guardians assume equal responsibility for following these and other prescribed guidelines set by the Marquette County Fair for these projects. I understand that as a part of my livestock project, I must volunteer a minimum of 2 hours during the Fair, at which I may sign up at animal check in.

## RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ENTRIES

1. Entries are open to the world. There are judged departments with premiums paid for youth and adults. Fair age is the exhibitor's age on January 1st of the year of the Fair. Age groups are as follows:

7 and under

8 - 13 years

14 - 19 years

20 and over

- Exhibitors must use the same number in all departments. The first letter of your last name and the last 4 digits of your SS# becomes vour exhibitor number.
- Pre-entry deadline by mail or internet is August 1st. This is encouraged to streamline the entry process. All indoor entries must be delivered to their respective departments on Wednesday of fair week from 4:00 PM to 8:00 PM. Exhibitors bringing items not pre-entered must fill out registration at this time.
- Release of still exhibits in the Expo and 4-H and Youth building will be Sunday from 10:00 AM till 1:00 PM. All animals will not be released until Sunday at 11:00 AM.
- 5. One entry per class except where permitted.
- Entries must have been completed since the previous year.
- All reasonable precautions will be taken to protect exhibits. The Fair will not be responsible for loss or injury of same.
- The management will use diligence to insure the safety of livestock and articles entered for exhibition or display after their arrival on the grounds but under no circumstances will it be responsible for loss, injury or damage by theft, fire, lightning, wind or by any other agency, to such livestock, article on exhibition or display, and the

- Fair and management thereof shall be held harmless by the exhibitors against all legal or other proceedings relating thereto.
- The Fair Board reserves the right to reject exhibits deemed unworthy (i.e., workmanship, cleanliness, etc.)
- 10. A premium ribbon or sticker placed on the exhibit is no guarantee of award. It is governed by the records on the judges' books.
- 11. The Marquette County Fair reserves the right to pro-rate premiums if fair receipts are insufficient to pay expenses.
- 12. The management reserves to itself the sole and absolute right to settle disputes and misunderstandings arising out of premium awards or any phase of enterprise of the Fair without claim for damages. A formal protest by an agricultural exhibitor, or others against a placing shall be filed no more than 24 hours after the placing is made. Any protest must be accompanied with written statement detailing specific problem and a \$25.00 deposit. The complaint will be sent to MDA within 45 days.
- 13. In the event of a conflict between general rules and those in a department, the special departmental rules take precedence. It is the exhibitor's responsibility to know the special rules of the departments they are entering.
- 14. There will be a \$20 fee for re-issue of any lost or mutilated premium
- 15. Unless otherwise stated, ribbons received are 1st Blue, 2nd Red & 3rd - White.
- 16. An official photographer shall be present on the grounds during the Fair. The Marquette County Fair reserves the right to use photographs of champions, reserve champions and other exhibitors for publicity or advertising purposes of the Fair without compensation to the exhibitor.

# Summary: 2021 HEALTH REQUIREMENTS FOR LIVESTOCK EXHIBITED IN MICHIGAN

(Replaces All Previous Editions)

The term "livestock" refers to those species of animals used for human food and fiber or to those species of animals used for service to humans. Thus, "livestock" includes (but is not limited to) cattle, sheep, New World camelids (llamas, alpacas, vicunas, and guanacos), goats, bison, privately-owned cervids, ratites (cassowaries, kiwis, ostriches, and emus), swine, equine, poultry, aquaculture, and rabbits. However, "livestock" does not include dogs and cats.

#### **GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL ANIMALS**

Exhibitors at state, county, and district fairs, along with other livestock exhibitions, expositions, and shows are required to comply with all the statutory and regulatory provisions of the State of Michigan relating to animal health outlined in the Animal Industry Act, 1988 PA 466, MCL 287.701-287.747. All animals include, but are not limited to, animals exhibited by 4-H and other youth, open classes, petting zoos, rodeos, circus animals, racing pigs, pony rides, exotic animals.

- A person who suspects or confirms an animal is either affected by a reportable disease or contaminated with a toxic substance shall immediately report to the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development Animal Industry Division (MDARD AID) at 800-292-3939 (daytime telephone) or 517-373-0440 (after hours emergencies).
- 2. Livestock with clinical signs of infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease, either at check-in or during the event, shall be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show. Alternatively, by permission of MDARD AID, such livestock may be isolated on the premises. An accredited veterinarian's knowledge and advice may be sought out by an exhibitor or exhibition staff to assess an animal for clinical signs of an infectious, contagious, or toxicological disease.
- A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority shall have an accredited veterinarian on call whenever there are animals on the premises.
- 4. All cattle, bison, farmed deer, goats, and sheep shall bear official United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) identification before they leave their home premises. Swine require official USDA identification prior to being exhibited.
- 5. It is the responsibility of exhibitors to ensure that all test charts, official identification, and interstate certificates of veterinary inspection or other movement documents required by this act accompany their animal(s) and that proof of fulfilling these requirements is provided to the director, fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority upon request.h certificate) required to accompany the livestock.
- A fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority shall do all of the following:
  - (a) Notify exhibitors of the official identification, health tests, and movement documents required for importation into and exhibition in this state.
  - (b) Examine and approve required official identification, certificates of veterinary inspection, test charts, and other required documentation before displaying, exhibiting, or stabling the animals in the exhibition area or before commingling with other animals.

- (c) Provide shipping arrangements for all exhibited livestock that are to be removed from the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show facility for direct movement to slaughter or to a market for livestock auction as that term is defined in 1937 PA 284, MCL 287.121 to 287.131.
- (d) Notify exhibitors whether poultry vaccinated against infectious laryngotracheitis are allowed in the fair, exhibition, or exposition.
- A fair or exhibition may require additional testing or vaccination of animals before entry and during the fair, exhibition, exposition, or show.
- Whenever an official test is conducted, or an official vaccination is administered, by an accredited veterinarian, livestock shall, unless exempted, be permanently identified in a manner approved by MDARD AID.
- Unless otherwise approved or waived by the director, all of the following apply to exhibition facilities:
  - (a) A facility for exhibition of animals shall be constructed in a manner to allow sufficient separation of each exhibitor's animals and to allow for sufficient separation of species. The facility shall be constructed of a material that can be adequately cleaned and disinfected.
  - (b) Animal housing shall be constructed and placed to provide adequate light and ventilation appropriate for the animals being housed.
  - (c) An exhibition facility and associated buildings shall be cleaned and disinfected with a state veterinarian-approved disinfectant used in accordance with label instructions before animals are admitted.
    - Virkon-S
    - Accelerated Hydrogen Peroxides (Accel, Intervention, or Rescue)
    - Bleach (such as Clorox) at a rate of 1:32, which is ½ cup (4 oz.) to one gallon of water. Do not add ammonia to bleach/water mixture.
    - Phenolic disinfectants (like Pinesol) for poultry equipment and coops
  - (d) Access to hand-cleansing facilities or hand-sanitizing methods shall be available in close proximity to each building that houses animals.
  - (e) Bedding used by livestock, feed waste, shipping containers, and other animal associated waste shall be removed from the animal area and disposed of in a timely and responsible manner.
  - (f) An animal shall not be used as a prize at a carnival or a midway

## 2021 GENERAL REQUIREMENTS FOR OUT-OF-STATE EXHIBITORS OF ANIMALS (Summary)

- An animal imported for exhibition shall meet the requirements for importation of the applicable species and shall be accompanied by a copy of an official interstate health certificate or an official interstate certificate of veterinary inspection that is issued by an accredited veterinarian from the state of origin.
- An animal shall not be diverted to premises other than the destination site named on the documentation that accompanies the animal.
- 3. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to ensure that all test charts, official identification, official interstate certificates of veterinary inspection or other movement documents required by this act accompany the animals of the exhibitor and that proof of fulfilling these requirements is provided to the director, fair, exhibition, exposition, or show authority upon request. activity unless approved by the director.

## **GUIDELINES FOR YOUTH SMALL** ANIMAL PROJECTS

- 1. The Marquette Co. 4-H and youth small animal committee shall consist of any and all interested members and leaders of the small animal clubs who carry organized projects.
- 2. The meetings of the small animal committee will be scheduled as deemed appropriate by the membership.
- 3. Marquette Co. youth small market animals shall be: Pen of 3 Market Chickens, Pen of 3 Market Rabbits, or 1 Market Turkey.
- 4. All market animals will be sold in the following order. Grand champion animals of each species first, then the reserve animal of a species followed by the remainder in judged order. The judge will determine sale order.

## 2021 - Turkeys, chickens, rabbits

2022 - Chickens, rabbits, turkeys

2023- Rabbits, turkeys, chickens

- 5. All small animal market projects must include a completed record book to be turned in to the superintendent by 3:00 p.m. on Thursday. A copy of this record book can be used to meet the requirements of Poultry and Rabbit Showmanship . . . Copy of which will be turned into the Small Animal Barn Superintendent.
- 6. Record books must be started on the day chicks arrive or the day the doe rabbit is bred.
- 7. All small animals must remain on the fairgrounds until close of fair
- 8. All exhibitors are responsible to butcher, properly prepare, and deliver the meat to the buyer within one week's time.
- 9. Pre-entry date for Market Chickens, Turkeys and Rabbits is June 1st to be sent to the Livestock Superintendent.
- 10. In order to be sold at the sale all market animals must be shown in both the market class and showmanship classes by its owner.

- 1. Market chickens shall be purchased approximately 8-10 weeks before the starting date of the fair.
- 2. The small animal committee will approve the vendor and/or breeder for market chickens and MUST be listed on record books, along with the date of purchase.
- 3. Pullets or cockerels are approved for this project.

#### **Market Rabbits**

- 1. All market rabbits must come from a doe owned and bred by the exhibitor.
- 2. Youth market rabbits must consist of a pen of three rabbits, from the same litter, not over 69 days old and between 3 and 5 pounds, by fair time.

#### **Market Turkeys**

- 1. Market turkeys shall be purchased approximately 15-20 weeks before the Marquette Co. Fair.
- 2. The vendor and/or breeder for market turkeys MUST be listed on record books, along with the date of purchase.
- 3. Toms or hens are approved for this project.
- 4. All turkeys will be leg banded by the owner upon arrival at the fair grounds, and recorded with the superintendent.

## LIVESTOCK RULES

## Guidelines:

- The livestock department committee shall be made up of the following: Fair president and/or fair board member, 4-H livestock leader/s, livestock superintendent and one teen representative.
- Market Animals and Exhibitors must be Marquette or Alger county residents. Competition is open to anyone between 9 years of age through the person's 19th birthday. Fair age is the exhibitors age on January 1 of the year of the fair.
- Steers must be purchased and on feed at least 205 days before sale date. Steers must be born after January 1 of the previous year. Lambs and hogs must be purchased and on feed at least 90 days before the sale date. Market Goats must be born after December 1st of previous year and must be at least 50% meat breeds (Boer, Kiko, Saneen and so forth). Goats exhibited in market class shall not be exhibited in breeding classes. Goats can be of either sex. The Marquette County Fair shall appoint a weigh in person(s) and he or she shall be the same person for all animals within the species. All animals are expected to be properly restrained for the
- Pre-Entry Dates for market livestock must be sent to livestock superintendent by: Beef - February 15th and Swine, Lamb, Goats, Poultry, Turkey and Rabbits June 1st.
- Beef members may start with no more than two steers. Sheep, swine and goats may start with a pen of three lambs, goats or hogs. Only one animal of each species may be shown or sold. All animals will be tagged or tattooed at the weigh in time. NO stags, warts, or horns over one inch will be permitted. Horns optional on goats only.
- All breeding stock, poultry, rabbits and pet stock MUST be preregistered with the fair by August 1st.
- All live stock entry forms must be accompanied by a signed code of conduct.
- NO replacement will be made in case of death of an animal after the weigh in unless an alternate animal is in the possession of the member and weighed in as of the weigh in dates. Replacement by an alternate animal may be made up to the final weigh in at
- All project animals shown in market classes will be made available to sell.
- 10. The purpose of the livestock project is to have a member become knowledgeable about feeding, breeding, raising and handling livestock. The show and sale at the fair is the end result. Any animal whose feeding and training has been neglected cannot be shown.
- 11. The judge has control over all exhibitors while they are showing. Anyone not able to control his or her animal to the satisfaction of the judge will be asked to leave the showing for the safety and respect of the other exhibitors.
- 12. A committee made up of at least three of the people listed in the first guideline reserve the right to visit the member's farm sometime in the two weeks before the fair to observe the member handle and lead his animal unassisted. The committee will decide at the time if it is a show or not show. The committee's decision is final at that time.
- 13. Minimum weight limits for market animals to be shown in market classes:

#### STEERS - 875 lbs. LAMBS - 90 lbs. **HOGS - 200 lbs.** GOATS - 70 lbs.

If 10 or more market animals are in a class they will be split equally by weight. Under weight animals may be shown in showmanship classes by its owner.

- 14. In order to be sold at the sale all market animals must be shown in both the market class and showmanship classes by its owner.
- 15. Record books must be exhibited at the fair. They must be completed by the final weigh in and turned into Superintendant by Thursday 8:00 AM before market livestock show.

## Junior Market Livestock Record keeping rules are as follows:

In order to participate in the junior market livestock competition

and sale, youth will be required to submit a completed set of records for their animals.

Beef, Sheep, Swine and Goat Exhibitors will have three record keeping classes based on the exhibitor's official age:

- Beginners (exhibitor's 9-10 years of age) are required to complete the Marquette County Market Livestock Book-Beginning
- Intermediate (exhibitor's 11-13 years of age) are required to complete the Marquette County Market Livestock Book-Intermediate
- Advanced (exhibitor's 14-19 years of age) are required to complete the Marquette County Market Livestock Book-Advanced

The record books entitled "Marquette County Market Livestock Record Book" are available on the website at www.marquettecountyfair.org. An interview will be required to determine cash prize winner in each age

Starting date for the market livestock record keeping project begins the date the animal is obtained. The final weight may be determined at home by tape measure or scale. This will allow the exhibitor to complete their record book prior to the fair.

Premiums will be forfeited if record books are not submitted by deadlines or are incomplete Exception to these rules may be granted by the Livestock Superintendent.

- 16. All animals need to be securely tied or penned and properly supervised. ALL cattle MUST have a safety rope and a halter.
- 17. During the fair, feeding times for all livestock (open & youth) shall be completed by 9:00 a.m. and 5:00 - 7:00 p.m. daily.
- 18. Owners will be responsible for the care of livestock until the animals are released from the fair, except for rabbits, poultry, and pet stock which follow the small animal barn rules. Owners will be responsible for cleaning their own pens.
- 19. Judging will be: Youth Danish system, Open Straight Scale, THE JUDGE'S DECISION IS FINAL.
- 20. A personal thank you to the buyers must be written. Checks will be held until a "thank you" note is written.
- 21. A flat selling fee of \$60 for Steers; \$40.00 for Hogs; \$30 for Lambs and Goats and \$25.00 for Small Animals will be held back from seller's checks to cover commissions and advertising

- 22. ENTRY TIMES: All poultry, rabbits, and pet stock must be tested and in place between 3:00 - 8:30 p.m. Wednesday. All market livestock will be weighed in between noon - 7:00 p.m. Wednesday. All other livestock shall enter the fair between Noon - 9 p.m. Wednesday. Late entry must be approved by the fair president and superintendent. ALL LIVESTOCK/ANIMALS MUST SHOW APPROPRIATE HEALTH PAPERS AND/OR IDENTIFICA-TION TO THE CLERK BEFORE UNLOADING AND/OR PENNING.
- 23. FAIR SCALE WEIGHT OF ANIMALS WILL PREVAIL: Scale weight of animals by a Marquette County Fair Official is FINAL. Any person disagreeing with weight of animals may be asked to take livestock home.
- 24. Sale order to begin with the Grand Champions of each species. The remaining animals within the species shall sell reserve champion first followed in judged order with each award being drawn by
  - SALE ORDER: Steers, Hogs, Lambs, Goats
- **Show Day** Refer to schedule on page 30.
- Marquette County Fair Junior Livestock Action is a Terminal Sale for all Market Animals.
- Release Times: No Livestock may be released until Sunday at 11:00 AM - Before Exhibitor leaves the fairgrounds the following requirements MUST be met:
  - Animals are to be fed one last time by 9:00 AM on Sunday
  - Thank you card given to superintendent
  - Pick up your livestock market book
  - Pens must be cleaned and free of any and all debris
  - Before exhibitor leaves fairgrounds you must check in with superintendent - at that time the superintendent will check your pen and barn area for cleanliness
  - Failure to comply with the rules stated above is \$150.00 forfeiture of your fair earnings
- 28. The Livestock Superintendents will advise who will be in the barn to load market animals. Barn will be closed while the animals are being loaded onto the trucks. Loading time scheduled for Sunday morning approximately 10:00 AM.







#### PARTICIPANT AGREEMENT, RELEASE, AND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT OF RISK

In consideration of the services of Marquette County Fair, their agents, owners, officers, volunteers, participants, employees, and all other persons or entities acting in capacity on their behalf (hereinafter collectively referred to as "MCF"), I hereby agree to release and discharge MCF, on behalf of myself, my children, my parents, my heirs, assigns, personal representative and estate as follows:

- 1. I acknowledge that MCF entail known and unanticipated risks which could result in physical or emotional injury, paralysis, death or damage to myself, to property, or to third parties. I understand that such risks simply cannot be eliminated without jeopardizing the essential qualities of the activity.
  - The risks include, among other things: Collision with other horses, animals/persons, the walls or other fixed objects; falling down; my own equipment failure or the failure of other's equipment; my own or other's negligence; objects or conditions on the arena surface that may cause me to fall; broken bones; sprains; head, neck and back injuries; abrasions; and bruises.
  - Furthermore, MCF employees have difficult jobs to perform. They seek safety, but they are not infallible. They might be unaware of a participant's fitness or abilities. They may give inadequate warnings or instructions, and the equipment being used might malfunction.
- 2. I expressly agree and promise to accept and assume all of the risks existing in this activity. My participation in this activity is purely voluntary, and I elect to participate in spite of the risks.

- At the gate you must leave a copy of current coggins test and show proof of Interstate Health Papers, if applicable, before entering the fairgrounds.
- Classification of ponies will be 50" and under and 50" to 3. 53". Measuring location to be announced on grounds.
- All ponies will be measured at the third vertebrae of the withers standing in a natural position; shoes will be deducted from height on pony.
- Ponies will be measured by a committee selected by the host of this event.
- No stimulated ponies will be allowed to pull.
- Each driver must take first pull after weight change, except on warm-up loads.
- NO whipping or undue use of the lines, mechanical or electrical devices, profanity or shouting will be permitted.
- Each team will be driven by one driver throughout the entire contest, except in case of injury.
- 10. Any forward movement of load after driver gives command to go will be counted as a pull.
- 11. The weight of load will be determined by the judges.
- 12. Three trials to each load. The driver must stay hooked for his second trial and return at the end for this third trial, third trial can pull either way.
- 13. There will not be over three tries to hitch or it will be counted as a pull.
- The distance for each pull is 14 feet, but distance of less than 14 feet will determine winner of place at end of contest. Distance chain will be fastened to center of rear of boat, other end of chain with stake also set to touch rear of boat.
- 15. If any pony steps on or over the ropes while pulling, the team will be disqualified for that given pull. This must be called by the judge.
- 16. No one horse will be allowed to pull in two classes.
- 17. Driver must be ready when his/her turn comes to pull.
- 18. If any team takes too long to get ready to pull, his/her pull can be taken away.
- 19. Any team declared unmanageable will be sent to the truck by the judges.
- 20. Teams must pull one official load to qualify for Premium money.
